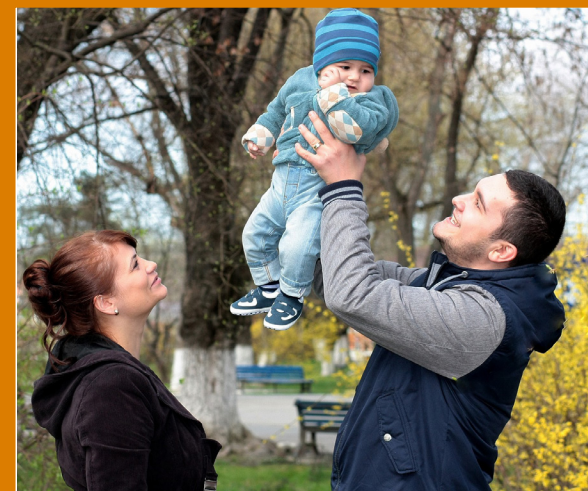

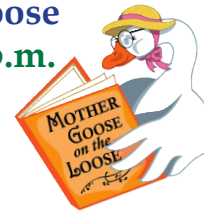

Mother Goose on the Loose (MGOL) is a method for planning and presenting programs that focus on the WHOLE CHILD and incorporates research based theories of learning-music, puppets, picture books, nursery rhymes, art, play and language.

MGOL follows the "Listen, Like, Learn" approach. Caregivers learn about their child's development through informal developmental tips, and children learn through purposeful play.
